Local collaboration

JUST continually collaborates with King Abdullah University Hospital (KAUH), a university-affiliated hospital, through signing bilateral agreements that meet the health needs of different populations. These collaborations are established at the highest administration levels between JUST and KAUH in accordance with the regulations of both parties. For example, the faculty of Dentistry at JUST has an outstanding collaboration with KAUH that is intended to provide high quality dental services by JUST faculty members to cancer patients at KAUH. National Collaboration

JUST has established an effective collaboration with the Ministry of Health. Under this collaboration, both parties have agreed to provide reciprocal services with an ultimate goal to improve health & wellbeing outcomes. JUST has agreed to provide medical and dental services to the beneficiaries of the Ministry of Health insurance. Examples of these services include medical consultations, surgeries, and laboratory and diagnostic procedures. JUST faculty members from the health sciences faculties (e.g., Faculty of Medicine) are responsible for providing medical services as long as that doesn't interrupt their academic and professional responsibilities as faculty members at JUST. The Ministry of Health, in turn, has agreed to open the doors of its hospitals, health centers, and facilities for all students at the health sciences faculty to perform clinical training of practicum courses. Global Collaboration

The Faculty of Nursing at JUST has been designated as the World Health Organization Collaborating Center for Nursing Development since 1997. This collaboration is continually reviewed and renewed every four years. JUST focuses, through this collaboration, on advancing human resource development in nursing and midwifery both nationally and regionally. This collaboration involves partnerships with reputable institutions, facilitating the enhancement of nursing education, research, practice, and leadership to address evolving health needs and promote health for all. The mission of the Faculty of Nursing as a collaborative center is to improve the skills of nurses and midwives through innovative interdisciplinary education, community outreach, and evidence-based practices. The Faculty of Nursing also engages in efforts to disseminate research that informs nursing care, health promotion, and leadership. This work highlights JUST commitment to continuous performance improvement, professional development, and fostering critical thinking and accountability within the nursing profession. Through these collaborative efforts, JUST contributes meaningfully to improving healthcare quality and access, impacting health and wellbeing outcomes in the communities we serve.
